From trains and cars to hyperloops and rideshare systems, discover how Cincinnati's urban design has both connected and divided the city and its people, and peek into the future at what the next transportation breakthrough might be.

1920 to 1950

Not all forms of transportation are finished or successful. Although the Cincinnati subway of the early 1900s was never finished, its efforts created Central Parkway and housing for utilities. Before Union Terminal, Cincinnati was serviced by five train stations spread throughout the city. Built on the site of Lincoln Park, Union Terminal was the solution to this problem.

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1950 to 1980

Methods of transportation that connected the city, like streetcars, fell out of popularity in favor of buses and personal automobiles. With necessary infrastructure to handle the surge in vehicle ownership, highways often divided neighborhoods. In Cincinnati, the West End neighborhood was fractured to make way for I-75.
